

MARCH FOR OUR LIVES

Survivors of the Marjory Stone Douglas High School shooting reignited the national conversation about gun control by speaking up, challenging their legislators, and organizing one of the largest peaceful protests in U.S. History

A former student open fires at Majorj Stoneman Douglas High School and kills 17 students and injures 17 more, making this mass shooting one of the top 10 deadliest in the U.S.



Feb. 14,
2018

One hour after the shooting, survivor Sarah Chadwick responds to President Trump's tweets offering his prayers and condolences by demanding policy change and becomes the first student to publicly challenge a politician to take action on gun control.

Feb. 17,
2018

- A gun control rally is held in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida.
- Emma González, an 18 year old senior, reignited the gun control conversation by delivering a 10 minute speech that quickly went viral.

Feb. 21,
2018

- CNN hosts a town hall event to allow students, parents of victims, and teachers to discuss gun control with Senator Marco Rubio and NRA spokesperson Dana Loesch.
- Audience members confront Rubio about the campaign contributions that he has received from the NRA and the weak response to mass shootings from himself and other lawmakers.

Students travel to Tallahassee and Washington, D.C to protest the National Rifle Association's monetary influence on politicians and demand an assault weapon ban.

Students return to class for the first time since the shooting.

The NRA releases the "Time is Running Out" video, threatening reporters for their biased reporting on the Parkland shooting.

National Walk Out Day Demonstrations take place all over the country to show solidarity with Parkland students' demands for stricter gun control legislation

- The March For Our Lives rally is held in Washington, D.C., with sibling protests in over 800 cities and every continent besides Antarctica.
- March For Our Lives became one of the youngest and largest peaceful protests in American history with approximately 2 million people in attendance.
